

What is an ESC?

- Legislation requires all school districts with less than 16,000 students to be aligned to an ESC
- Ongoing support for legislative requirements and best practices
- Consortium/grant opportunities
- Employ high demand positions (school psychs, SLPs, etc)
- Shared trainings and resources
- Provide shared services for districts

There are currently 51 ESCs serving districts across Ohio



Who are we?

- Serve 18 member districts, 2 County Boards of DD, 2 Career Centers, 11 Alternative schools
- 6 Counties: Tuscarawas, Belmont, Guernsey, Carroll, Harrison, Noble
- Approximately 25,000 students
- Around 600 employees

How did we get here?

Cycle of poverty

- □ 34% of children in Guernsey County fall below the poverty level
- ☐ 44% of county residents receive public health coverage
- ☐ 16% are food insecure
- ☐ 58% have a high school diploma or less, 14.2% have a bachelor's degree or higher
- ☐ Per capita income of \$23,599 (state avg. \$31,293)

Access to resources

40% of residents have traveled outside the county to access health care - access to licensed physicians is 1:614 (well below the state avg. of 1:185), access to licensed psychologist is 1:13,293 (state avg. 1:3,620)

Children in placement

- □ In 2021, 237 children were deemed unsafe in their own homes 163 were able to be safely maintained with kin, 73 entered agency custody. In comparison, in 2014, there were 22 children that entered agency custody.
- ☐ In total, there were 156 children in agency custody in 2021 this is the highest number we have seen in Guernsey County.

Substance Abuse

Overdose deaths in Guernsey County have increased by 42% in the last 3 years

- □ In November 2022 a meeting was held with agencies and providers to look at community needs and prevention strategies.
- We used that information to inform our grant proposal.

- ☐ Will identify barriers and gaps in service and community needs

Prevention HUBs Mobile & Community

Partnerships with area organizations to offer HUBS

- Offer free education and resources to families in areas such as parenting skills, budgeting, nutrition, job search, housing and access to resources
- ☐ Fund 3 providers to be trained in the Triple P Parenting curriculum









ECOESC entered into a partnership with Bridges to Wellness to implement the Pathways Community HUB Institute Model of Community-Based Care Coordination

"The PCHI® Model helps communities build a transformative and sustainable community-based care coordination network. Community health workers (CHWs) were the reason the Model was originally designed. CHWs are uniquely able to engage community residents at risk for poor health and social outcomes. The PCHI Model provides training and tools for CHWs to identify risk factors and work towards eliminating those risks one by one. The model provides the infrastructure to track risk factors from identification through mitigation and link payment directly to outcomes. The PCHI Model is a quality improvement framework for communities to build their own robust network of community-based care coordination in partnership with local stakeholders to align resources and achieve positive outcomes."

WHAT IS A CERTIFIED

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER?



The Northwest Ohio Pathways HUB system relies on certified community health workers (CHWs), who help connect low-income residents to needed medical care and social services. Who are CHWs, and what can they do for you?

CHWS Serve as partners & coaches

to help people take charge of their health.

DOCTORS
SERVICES

Connect

to health insurance, a primary care provider and medical services. **EDUCATE** people about their conditions, and provide referrals to community resources.





Ensure people are able to get food, housing, clothing, and other Basic needs.

Work at physician offices, clinics, agencies and other places throughout the community.



Our goal is to receive referrals of students and families with identified barriers that affect their success in school.



Community Care Coordinators will provide ongoing support and education to eliminate barriers, empowering families to become independent and selfsufficient.

"How does this work?"

- REFER Pisk or barrier
- Student/family demonstrate signs of risk or barrier
- Referring agent identifies risk or barrier
- Referring agent informs parent about care coordination services
- Referring agent completes and submits referral form
- Care coordinator reaches out to student and family to establish relationship
- Care coordinator provides ongoing education and support until risks and barriers are eliminated

Who Could Be Referred?

- children/families experiencing homelessness or housing instability
- students/families who may experience food insecurity
- children/families with lack of personal care items/hygiene products/clothing
- children with social-emotional, mental health or behavioral healthcare needs
- children/families lack of healthcare and dental care
- children who are pregnant or parenting
- children/families with experienced trauma or experiencing trauma
- children with gaps in educational development
- children/families who lack support and resources outside of school
- children with chronic absenteeism
- children with medical handicaps



Guernsey CARES: Community Care Coordination

- We have employed 3 full-time Community Care Coordinators to serve Guernsey County.
- All three Care Coordinators have earned their Community Health Worker credential.
- Monthly visits include an educational component geared toward meeting the child/family needs.
- Ongoing work includes removing barriers and completing steps toward pathway completion.
- To date, we have 63 participants enrolled in Care Coordination.
- Care Coordinators play a crucial role in bridging the gap between healthcare services and the community, providing invaluable support, guidance, and advocacy. Their presence and expertise have been essential in promoting positive health outcomes and fostering strong, trusting relationships with their families and the community.
